**Commissioner Andy Gipson Announces 2025-2026 Mississippi Agriculture Youth Council
Students from Alcorn, Covington, George, Hinds, Itawamba, Jones, Kemper, Neshoba, Oktibbeha,
Panola, and Scott Counties Chosen for Council**

JACKSON, Miss. – Today, Commissioner of Agriculture and Commerce Andy Gipson announced the members of the 2025-2026 Mississippi Agriculture Youth Council. High school senior Mason Williams of Hinds County was among the 14 student finalists chosen to serve on the 2025 Ag Youth Council. Mason, son of Bryan and Tiffany Williams, is homeschooled in Raymond.

Members were chosen through an application process and were interviewed by a committee of representatives from the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce (MDAC) and other agriculture industry leaders.

The 2025 Mississippi Agriculture Youth Council is comprised of 14 high school seniors with an interest in agriculture. The goal of this council is to expose the students to a variety of agriculture career fields and to teach them how to advocate for various aspects of the agriculture industry.

Over the course of one year, council members will visit agricultural companies and organizations; learn about the legislative process and how it affects the agriculture industry; hold discussions with industry professionals; and hone career-development skills. Council members will serve from August 2025 to June 2026 and attend a minimum of four meetings at the MDAC headquarters located in Jackson.
